Pastor's Corner



This month, as I prepare to begin my ministry with you, I want to introduce myself a little more, and tell you about why I am excited to become a pastor at Covenant.

One of the things that makes Covenant special is its existence as a multiracial community. There are other communities where you will find people of more than one race, but most of them are not like Covenant: a place where people of different races get to know each other and truly

embrace each other as family.

Given that, I'd like to tell you about some of the other multiracial communities I've been privileged to be a part of.

In college, I was a member of a fraternity where about a third of the members were international students. We had people from India, Ethiopia, Vietnam, Mexico, Rwanda, China, and Myanmar, as well as a rich racial and cultural tapestry from within the U.S. I was glad to be part of an organization that could create a sense of welcome and a simulacrum of home for so many people.

After college, I worked as a G.E.D. Prep and English as a Second Language instructor for adult ex-offenders on home detention, probation, and parole. Among both our staff and our clients, there were people of multiple races and backgrounds. When I worked there, there were moments when I thought about going to law school. I believed many of my clients were innocent and could have benefited from a good public defender, someone who really cared about them and would fight for them.

But rather than law school, God called me to seminary. I attended Columbia Theological Seminary in the greater Atlanta area, and while there, I was highly involved in homeless ministries and a domestic violence ministry. I also worked for a year and a half as a reading and writing tutor at a community college. After seminary, I worked as a chaplain resident at Grady Memorial Hospital, Atlanta's version of Truman: an urban, public, trauma hospital, with about three times more capacity than Truman. As you may imagine, there was some diversity there.

I met my wife at seminary, and we spent the first year and a half of our married lives living in an intentional Christian community in an economically-wounded neighborhood of Atlanta, a neighborhood that is pretty similar to Covenant's. There, I partnered with a Pentecostal minister, and we started a G.E.D. Prep ministry together.

The most important multiracial community I have been part of is my family. My sister's ex-husband is black, and their three kids are of mixed race. My niece, Tracey, was killed on the night of Thanksgiving, 2019. She left behind two siblings. Latrell is 26, and works as a line chef in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Antwon is 19, and he is an active-duty member of the Marine Corps, stationed in North Carolina. I'm proud of them both in different ways.

Session Snippets

November's Total Income was \$23,658.08. Total Expenses were \$12,485.35; Net Income was \$11,172.73. Pledged Income was 91.3% of budgeted pledged income. An anonymous 2023 designated donation (\$11,400) accounted for a large portion of Total Income.

Presbyterian Urban and Immigrant Ministry Network (PUIMN) has approved a 2023 grant (\$8,555) for Covenant's ministries.

Adult Sunday School (ADS) is studying what it means to be a Matthew 25 Church. Three new persons have joined ADS.

Church Safety Team recommends Rev. Steven Andrews, Interim Pastor starting January 1, begin a neighborhood engagement campaign this spring.

Approved a motion to receive the Interim Pastor Search Committee Report, to thank the IPSC, and to disband the committee. Approved a motion from Stewardship Committee to repay the remaining balance (~\$3,000) of the 2022 per capita funds. Approved a motion to use the Christmas Eve Offering to meet the needs of persons needing warm clothes.

Rev. Coulter expressed appreciation for serving as Session Moderator in the interim. Session thanked Rev. Coulter for exemplary service as Session Moderator, presenting him with a signed Thank-You Card and \$100 Panera Gift Card.

Spiritual Life

At its December meeting, the Spiritual Life Committee discussed our presentation at the last Session meeting concerning our suggestions for possible placement of the Committee's functions under the direction of the Session, especially in light of our Matthew 25 Church focus. Additionally, the committee discussed areas which we feel are special priorities, and we will forward that information to the Session. Our next Zoom meeting will be at 10 A.M. on January 21. All are welcome.

Food Pantry

Our Community Food Pantry was open 14 days in December. Covenant Church spent \$3,179 to feed 367 households, comprised of 513 adults, 414 children, and 128 seniors.
