

The New Road Forward: Clemson University's Master of Transportation Safety is Developing Tomorrow's Road Safety Leaders

Three years ago, at the NAWHSL meeting in Atlanta, GA, I shared information with you about plans for a brand new, first-in-the-nation advanced degree program – the Clemson University Master of Transportation Safety Administration (MTSA). I'm pleased to share where the program stands today and how you could be a part of it.

The road ahead necessitates the ability of the road safety professional to use evidence-based strategies and solve

problems by working effectively with and accessing the combined knowledge of diverse teams of transportation professionals. Teamwork, collaboration, communication and critical thinking are necessary elements for success in road safety management and administration. Silo disciplines are no longer capable of meeting the current and future challenges of road safety management and administration alone. The practice of road safety management and administration has increasingly become both interdisciplinary and team oriented.

Developed in coordination with a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) of prominent national leaders with tremendous expertise in the field of road safety, and offered exclusively online, the <u>Clemson University Master of Transportation Safety Administration (MTSA)</u> was established to meet this critical, and previously unaddressed, need. Clemson University is excited to offer this innovative, one-of-a-kind experience to working professionals and students throughout the country and throughout the world.

Launched in the fall of 2019, MTSA is a two-year, 30-credit hour, non-thesis interdisciplinary program that addresses the need for a road safety workforce capable of deploying evidence-based strategies and best practices supported by ongoing research. If you are passionate about road and transportation safety, you should consider this program.MTSA provides road safety professionals with a sound knowledge base of theory and evidence-based solutions that can be effectively applied to programs administered by State Highway Safety Offices, state DOT's, and other road safety organizations.

Current MTSA students are real-life examples of how road safety stretches across disciplines and requires innovative thinking from different disciplines to build solutions to important human-vehicle-road safety issues. Students in the program hail from states throughout the U.S., from Georgia to Arizona, and internationally as far away as Botswana.

The first cohort of MTSA students graduated in August 2021. We are very proud of the students in the MTSA program and are excited to see all that they, and future MTSA graduates, will accomplish. 2021 MTSA graduates are:
