New Protection For Employees

Unemployment Claims Over One Million

The Illinois Department of Employment Security released new statewide data showing the department processed 74,476 new initial unemployment claims and has now processed 1,006,925 initial unemployment claims from March 1st through May 2nd. Last year, IDES processed just 78,100 claims.

Statewide data, which reflects activity for the week prior, will be available on the IDES website every Thursday afternoon

Workers who believe they may be eligible for new federal benefits under the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance program, must first apply for regular unemployment insurance. Claimants who receive

an eligibility determination of \$0 can then appeal that decision by providing verification of wages earned submit a claim for PUA benefits. Claimants who have already applied for and been denied regular unemployment benefits can submit a claim through the new PUA portal

PUA provides 100% federally-funded unemployment benefits for individuals who are unemployed for specified COVID-19-related reasons and are not eligible for the state's regular unemployment insurance program, the extended benefit program under Illinois law, or the Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation program, including independent contractors and sole-proprietors. Up to 39 weeks' worth of benefits are potentially available under the program for COVID-19-related

unemployment claims. PUA claims will be

backdated to the individuals' first week of unemployment, but no earlier than Feb. 2nd, and will continue for as long as the individual remains unemployed as a result of COVID-19, but no later than the week ending Dec. 26th. The program is similar to the federal Disaster Unemployment Assistance program which provides unem-

ployment benefits in response to local disasters. Those with questions

IDHR Releases Training Program

The Illinois Department of Human Rights released its model Harassment Sexual Prevention Training program for employers in compliance with Public Act 101-0221 (commonly referred to as the Workplace Transparency Áct). Únder

this Act, employers are required to train employees on sexual harassment prevention by Dec. 31st, 2020, and on an annual basis thereafter.

Employers must either develop their own training program that equals or exceeds the minimum standards for sexual harassment prevention training outlined in Section 2-109(B) of the Illinois Human Rights Act or use the model training provided

Mayor Lori Lightfoot introduced a landmark ordinance to protect workers from termination or demotion if they are unable to work due to a public health directive. The proposed COVID-19 Anti-Retaliation Ordinance will ensure that employ-ees will be able to remain at home if they have COVID-19 symptoms or are subject to a quarantine isolation order without fear of being fired. Under the ordinance. an employer cannot ter-

minate or demote an employee for staying home from work due to a public health order issued by the Mayor, Governor of Illinois, the Chicago Department of Public Health, or a healthcare provider. Under current Public Health Orders, this includes anyone that is staying home because they: are sick with symptoms of COVID-19; work at a business deemed non-essential Governor Pritzker's Stay at Home Order; have been ordered to quarantine or isolate due to exposure to someone with COVID-19.

Governor Addresses **Teacher Shortage**

To address the educator shortage that Illinois faces, and a pandemic that has changed the educational experience for all students, Gov. JB Pritzker recently signed Executive Order 2020-31 to help teacher, paraprofessional, and other educator candidates gain licensure and join the workforce.

This past October, Illinois schools faced more than 4,800 unfilled positions, including for teachers, social workers, administrators, and paraprofessionals.

Executive Order 2020-31 waives requirements for those educator candidates who cannot complete normal student teaching, internships, and other pre-licensure exams, including the edTPA, this spring be-cause of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Teacher candidates who are eligible for these exemptions have already undergone extensive coursework, pre-clinical fieldwork experiences, and a licensure content test to prepare them for the professional educator license.

EO 2020-31 also waives certain requirements, such as the Constitution exam and physical fitness test, for eighth graders and high school seniors so they can graduate.

The order only affects students who are completing program requirements during the Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamations period and whose institution verifies that the student could not complete the require-ment due to COVID-19. Institutions still have the authority to evaluate the students' progress in meeting program requirements. ISBE and IBHE will monitor the pandemic situation and make any recommendations for the fall semester as warranted.

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White an-nounced that the U.S. De-partment of Homeland Security has extended the federal REAL ID deadline an additional year to Oct. 1st, 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Current Illinois driver's license or ID cards will continue to be accepted at airports, military bases and secure federal facilities. Once Driver Services facilities reopen, White is suggesting that people who want a REAL ID wait until their current driver's license or ID card is about to expire before visiting a facility to apply. For those whose driver's license or ID card expires after Oct. 1st, 2021 and want a REAL ID, they can use their valid U.S. passport or other TSA-acceptable documents to fly domesti-cally until they renew their current card.

The Illinois Department of Employment Sereleased curity new instructions for 1099 workers who have lost work due to COVID-19. Workers who believe they may be eligible for new federal benefits under the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance program, must first apply for regular unemployment insurance before applying for bene-fits under PUA when a new application portal opens on May 11th via the

IDES website. If claimants receive an eligibility determination of \$0, they can then appeal that decision by providing verification of wages earned, or submit a claim for PUA benefits. Claimants who have already applied for and been denied regular unemployment benefits can submit a claim through the new PUA portal when it opens. Receiving a denial for regular unemployment benefits is a mandatory first step in determining eligibility for

PUA. Filing for regular unemployment also provides claimants the opportunity to select how they want to receive benefits. Eligible claimants can choose between direct deposit or a debit card onto which their benefits will be loaded. Debit cards can take up to one to two weeks to receive in the mail while direct deposit payments take two to three days once a claimant completes their

weekly certification for benefits. PUA provides 100% federally-funded unem-ployment benefits for individuals who are unemployed for specified COVID-19-related rea-sons and are not eligible for the state's regular unemployment insurance program, the extended benefit program under Illinois law, or the Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation program, including independent contractors and
