
Life Under The Sun – Ecclesiastes


What does the phrase "under the sun" mean?

"Under the sun" means living your life without God and without God's Word

Circle eight phrases in Romans 8:1-9 that are like living "under the sun"


Circle three phrases in Ephesians 2:1-3 that are like living "under the sun"


Circle seven phrases in Romans 8:1-9 that are opposite of living "under the sun"

Circle six phrases in Galatians 5:16-25 that are opposite of living "under the sun"

¹⁶I say then: Walk in the Spirit, and you shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh. ¹⁷For the flesh lusts against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; and these are contrary to one another, so that you do not do the things that you wish.

the law. ¹⁹ Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, ²⁰ idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, heresies, ²¹ envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like; of which I tell you beforehand, just as I also told *you* in time past, that those who practice such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. ²² But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, self-control. Against such there is no law. ²⁴ And those *who are* Christ's have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵ If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit. **Galatians 5:16-25**

"No Profit" (a Rip Off) living "under the sun" (without God)

"What profit has a man from all his labor in which he toils under the sun?" Ecclesiastes 1:3

"Then I looked on all . . . There was no profit under the sun." Ecclesiastes 2:11

What does Solomon's phrase, "no profit under the sun." mean to you and me?

That all the pleasures "under the sun" (in this world) are not worth it and will not satisfy us!

How does Matthew 16:26 apply to Solomon and Ecclesiastes?

"For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" Matthew 16:26

In Ecclesiastes, Solomon is telling us that he gained the whole world, and it was "vanity" (useless).



The following Scriptures explain how the world was not worth it to Solomon: ¹ The words of the Preacher, the son of David, king in Jerusalem. ² "Vanity of vanities," says the Preacher; "Vanity of vanities, all *is* vanity." ³ What has a man from all his labor In which he toils ______? Ecclesiastes 1:1-3 profit under the ¹² I, the Preacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. ¹³ And I set my heart to seek and search out by wisdom concerning all that is done under heaven; this burdensome task God has given to the sons of man, by which they may be exercised. ¹⁴ I have seen all the works that are done under the sun; and indeed, ____ and grasping for the wind. 
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
In Matthew 16:26, how does the phrase "gains the whole world" apply to you and me?

We were trying to gain pleasures through drugs, fornication, etc.

In Matthew 16:26, what is your and my answer to "What will a man give in exchange for his soul?"

We do not want to exchange our souls for pleasures through drugs, sex, etc





²⁴ Then Jesus said to His disciples, "If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me. ²⁵ For whoever desires to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will find it. ²⁶ For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" **Matthew 16:24-26**

In Matthew 16:25, what does the phrase "whoever desires to save his life will lose it" mean to you and me?

If we "save" (choose) "life" in this world (pleasures), we "lose" (forfeit) "life" (our souls) in eternity).

In Matthew 16:25, what does the phrase "whoever loses his life for My sake will find it" mean to you and me?


If we deny ("loses") "life" (pleasures in this life)) for Jesus sake, we will "find it" (gain) eternal life.



In 1 John 2:15-17, why does God tell you and me not to "love . . . the things of the world?"

Because the "things" (pleasures) of the world will never satisfy us, and they are bad for us!





In Luke 18:18-23, what was the rich young ruler's response to the proposition Jesus offered him?

¹⁸ Now a certain ruler asked Him, saying, "Good Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" ¹⁹ So Jesus said to him, "Why do you call Me good? No one *is* good but One, *that is*, God. ²⁰ You know the commandments: *'Do not commit adultery,' 'Do not murder,' 'Do not steal,' 'Do not bear false witness,' 'Honor your father and your mother.'* " ²¹ And he said, "All these things I have kept from my youth." ²² So when Jesus heard these things, He said to him, "You still lack one thing. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." ²³ But when he heard this, he became very sorrowful, for he was very rich." **Luke 18:18-23**

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
