Retirement For Chief Justice



Justice Anne M. Burke

Chief Justice Anne M. Burke has announced her retirement from the Illinois Supreme Court with her last day on the bench Nov. 30th. She has served on the Supreme Court since 2006 and Chief Justice from October 2019 to Oct. 25th, 2022.

"I have been blessed to serve as a Supreme Court Justice for the past 16 years and have loved working with my staff, colleagues and Judicial Branch staff to serve the people of Illinois," Burke said. "The past three years as Chief Justice have been a challenging time due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but I am thrilled with the progress made by the Illinois Courts."

Born in Chicago in 1944 and raised on the South Side, Burke received her Bachelor of Arts degree from the DePaul University School for New Learning, where she majored in Education. A longtime advocate for children with learning differences, her teaching career began with physi-

cal education at the Chicago Park District. There she took part in a new program that offered children and young adults with mental and physical differences, the opportunity to learn the skills to participate in sports.

Having recognized the positive impact that sports competition had on her students, she championed the idea of a city-wide competition. This led to the creation of the Chicago Special Olympics in 1968, which grew to become the International Special Olympics, reaching tens of millions in 192 nations. Burke later served as a Director of the International Special Olympics and remains involved with the Chicago Special Olympics organization and serves on the Executive Steering Committee of the Kennedy Forum Illinois.

In 1983, Burke attended the Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago-Kent College of Law and received her Juris Doctorate. In 1987, Governor James Thompson appointed her Judge to the Court of Claims and, in 1991, was reappointed by Governor Jim Edgar. In April 1994, she was appointed special counsel to the Governor for Child Welfare Services; in August 1995, was appointed to the Appellate Court, First District and in 1996, was elected to the Appellate Court, First District, for a full term.

She was appointed to the Supreme Court on July 6, 2006, following the retirement of late Mary Ann McMorrow, and was elected to that office in 2008. In 2018, she was retained for a second 10-year term with 81 percent of the vote.

The new vaccines from Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna are called "bivalent boosters," a mix of two versions of the vaccine. Both boost protection against original coronavirus strain as well as (newly) protecting against the BA.4 and BA.5 Omicron subvariants.

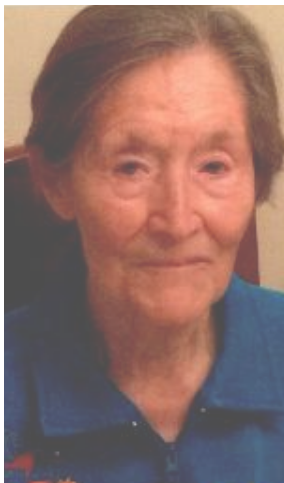
