Cooldest Products Made in Illinois

With almost 100,000 votes cast, the field of contenders competing in the fourth annual "Makers Madness" contest has been narrowed to the Top 16. Hosted by the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, the bracket-style tournament allows voters to decide which product is The Coolest Thing Made in Illinois.

Presented by Comcast Business, the competition celebrates manufacturers who have long served as the backbone of the state's economy. They produce nutritious food and snacks to life-saving vaccines and medical treatments to electric vehicles, sporting equipment and structural products like steel, rebar and motors to chemicals and high-tech gadgets used for national defense and energy to power homes and businesses. A recent study found the total economic impact of manufacturing in Illinois is estimated to be between \$580 billion and \$611 billion every year, the largest share of any industry to the state's Gross Domestic Product.

Nearly 250 unique products from across the state were nominated for the 2023 title. The top four vote-getters from the initial round of voting are the Accuchiller NQ Series Brewery & Distillery Glycol Chiller manufactured by Thermal Care in Niles; the Jessup Safety Track Recon by Jessup Manufacturing in McHenry; Hummer EV Headlights by North American Lighting in

Salem; and the Bison PowerSTAR Coffee Roasting Gearmotor made by Bison Gear & Engineering Corp in St. Charles.

Voting for this round is now open at www.makersmadnessil.com through March 12th. Voters may cast one vote per day in each of the eight head-to-head match-ups between individual products. Consecutive rounds of voting will take place each week, with vote totals reset to zero at the beginning of each round. The contest will culminate with an awards ceremony at the Governor's Mansion on March 29th.

Open Search For Police Superintendent

The Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability will launch a nationwide search for the next Superintendent of the Chicago Police Department, following the announcement that Superintendent David Brown will resign effective March 16th.

When a vacancy occurs, the Commission is charged with conducting a search, recruiting candidates, reviewing applications, performing background checks, conducting interviews, and selecting three finalists to present to the Mayor. The Mayor must select a Superintendent from the finalists, or reject them. The Mayor may only select a Superintendent from a list provided by the Commission.

At least four public hearings will be held across the city, at which members of the public can provide recommendations to inform the selection of candidates. Updates on the search

process will be posted to the CCPSA website and given at the Commission's monthly public meetings on the last Thursday of each month.

Teacher Pipeline Grant Program

Governor JB Pritzker announce the proposed Teacher Pipeline Grant Program will direct \$70 million per year over the next three years to the 170 school districts with the greatest need to fill teaching positions.

Pritzker was joined by Dr. Tony Sanders, who began his tenure as state superintendent on Feb. 23rd. He previously served as superintendent of School District U-46, which is based in Elgin.

The Horizons4U program was launched last spring, allowing employees who already work for the district to pursue a career in teaching and several other professions. Horizons4U is a collaborative effort between neighboring universities and colleges to cover the tuition cost, and participants pledge to continue working for at least five years under their new credentials.

The Teacher Pipeline Grant Program will allow

districts maximum flexibility to use the funds in innovative ways, such as offering signing bonuses, housing stipends, down-payment assistance, or loan repayments; paying tuition and fees or providing residencies or apprenticeships; and sustaining current teachers by providing materials, supplies, coaching, and school culture supports.

ISBE will utilize \$6 million in federal funds to procure a multimedia advertising and marketing firm to develop and implement a statewide teacher recruitment campaign.

Teacher shortage data recently released by ISBE show that Illinois schools reported 3,558 unfilled teaching positions as of October 2022. The vacancies in the 170 districts targeted for the Teacher Pipeline Grant Program account for 80 percent of all unfilled teaching positions and affect 870,000 students.

Funding For Opioid Crisis

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot and the Chicago Department of Public Health will implement new initiatives to address the ongoing opioid epidemic using funding from settlements with the three largest pharmaceutical distributors: McKesson; Cardinal Health and AmerisourceBergen; and manufacturer Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc. and its parent company Johnson & Johnson. These settlements provide substantial funds to states and municipalities to address the ongoing opioid epidemic.

The Illinois Remediation Fund will receive 55% of the settlement proceeds, estimated at \$437M over 18 years, and will be administered by the Illinois Department of Human Services for programs and purposes that address the opioid crisis. The Illinois Opioid Advisory Board will make recommendations regarding

the use of these funds.

The other 45% of the settlement proceeds will be distributed among the state, counties, municipalities, and townships. The Illinois Attorney General's Office estimates that Chicago will receive approximately \$78M over 18 years.

Rock crushing facilities take concrete, bricks, rock, stone and paving asphalt and process them into smaller, more manageable pieces that can be used as fill material at construction sites and road projects.
