Cuba is a Caribbean island nation under communist rule. It has sugar-white beaches and is dotted with tobacco fields, which play a part in the production of the country's legendary cigars.

### Did you know?

Did you know that Election Day was designated as the Tuesday following the first Monday in November back in 1845? At the time, officials calculated that farmers needed a day to get to the county seat to cast ballots but did not want to interfere with church day on Sunday, so they chose Tuesday.

Did you know that the first woman to run for president was in 1872? Victoria Woodhull, leader of the Suffragette movement in the US ran for president almost 50 years before women were allowed to vote in presidential elections (1920).
