Did you know—Politics?

Barack Obama is the 43rd person to become United States President. He became the 44th President because the office was held twice by Grover Cleveland (terms 1885-1889 and 1893-1897), being the 22nd and 24th President.

The candidate who ran the most times for the office of the President of the US was Norman Thomas. He ran six times from 1928 and never won. Thomas ran for the presidency in 1928, 1932, 1936, 1940, 1944 and 1948.

The US Presidential candidate with the highest popular vote ever was Ronald Reagan. In 1984 he secured 54,455,075 votes.

US Presidents are not elected by popular vote but by an electoral college representing the states. John Quincy Adams (1824), Rutherford Hayes (1876), Benjamin Harrison (1888) and George W. Bush (2000) lost the popular vote but won the presidency.
