Mary Ann Morton with PEO

Our speaker today was Mary Ann Morton from the P. E. O. Chapter H C. The HC stands for hot cookies? And for many years the PEO meaning was a big secret. It was a closely guarded secret that only the members knew what it stood for. In 2008, the Sisterhood revised its website to indicate that "P.E.O." now publicly stands for "Philanthropic Educational Organization". However, the Sisterhood acknowledges that "P.E.O." originally had a different meaning that continues to be "reserved for members only", and so the public meaning is not the only one.^[6]

the local chapter raises money to help women a college by the name of Cottey. More than \$5.8 million in financial aid was awarded to these students in 2012 – 2013. The average financial aid package in 2011 – 2012 was \$18,000 and in 2012 – 2013 \$19,373 per student. Cottey college is in Nevada Missouri. It was founded in 1884 as a place where young women could put their dreams in motion. In 1927, ownership of Cottey was given to the P. E. O. Sisterhood. Today it is the only nonsectarian institution of higher learning in the country solely owned and supported by women.
